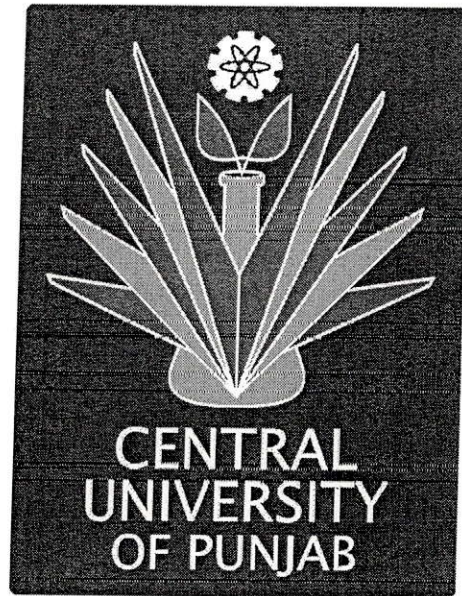

Report of the Vice Chancellor on the progress of the University since last meeting.

The Vice Chancellor made a PPT presentation before the EC to demonstrate the progress of the University since the Thirteenth Meeting of Executive Council held on 14.1.2015.

The members appreciated the progress made by the university and complemented on best research output in comparison to other Central Universities.

**To consider the deferred

(Tenth Meeting).**

The Secretary informed the Council that in the last meeting of the Executive Council (vide item EC:13:2015:1C dated 14.01.2015) the Council had deferred this item for want of documents for seeking clarity on the appointments of Deputy Registrar and UDC.

The Vice Chancellor had gone through the documents/records related to these appointments and his observations were shared with the members.

The Chairman informed the members that after going through the records of appointments of Ms. Shweta Arora, Deputy Registrar and Ms. Poonam Rani, UDC, it was found that the records available with the office of the Registrar are incomplete/deficient especially in case of the appointment of Deputy Registrar.

Answers to some of the queries that emerged out from the available documents could not be found. Why the advertisements were made 5 times changing the terms and conditions everytime; why applicants of each of the advertisements were clubbed for shortlisting when eligibility conditions had changed; when the number of applicants were enough everytime; why the earlier advertisements were not closed before advertising the new one. It was observed that in response to the first two advertisements none was found suitable by the selection committee.

Mrs. Shweta Arora who was not eligible for the post of Deputy Registrar vide earlier advertisement became eligible vide the revised advertisement of 2013, when the clause of grade pay was included. Was it to make her eligible? Her latest application was considered, though she had applied in response to the earlier one. The supporting documents which could make her eligible as per the latest advertisement, were not available.

Subsequently, a note from office of the Vice Chancellor was issued to both DR and UDC on 19.1.2015 to trace the record. Incidentally, both were among the so to say the initial recruits who have been working since 2009, when the university was functioning from Camp Office. The

replies were received from the employees and in nutshell, the status of missing record remained ambiguous.

The Vice Chancellor told that he had allowed the DR to reconstruct the files of both DR and UDC.

Consequently, the DR procured the following documents (*which were missing from her file*) from Baba Farid University of Health of Sciences, Faridkot, where she had worked before joining this university and sought permission to append these in her personal file which she did vide receipt No. VCO/591 and VCO/592 dated 13.3.2015:

- a. Experience Certificate
- b. Salary details/pay fixation

The Chairman informed the Council that upon scrutiny of documents, it was observed that there was no serious irregularity in terms of eligibility condition found in case of appointment of Ms. Shweta Arora as Deputy Registrar.

The Chairman admitted that the authenticity of the documents submitted is yet to be ascertained.

He also explained that in case of **Ms. Poonam Rani**, it is found that as per material on records her appointment as Upper Division Clerk (regular basis) is not as per the minimum eligibility conditions notified vide advertisement No. NT-11 (2013).

After detailed discussions, in case of Ms. Poonam Rani, Er. Shamlal Garg suggested that she be given a chance to defend her eligibility for the post of UDC. In case the response is not satisfactory, a "single person enquiry committee" be constituted by the Vice Chancellor to verify the facts and figures of the case. The Council suggested that the member of the committee so constituted may be a Retired Session Judge or person with equivalent stature.

University should also appoint a Presenting Officer (university representative) to coordinate with the committee. After the committee submit its report on the case, action can be taken accordingly. **It was agreed to.**

The Council considered the observations of Vice Chancellor. It was also realized that lapse what-so-ever, if any was not committed by the incumbent. After discussions it was unanimously **RESOLVED** to approve the appointment of Ms. Shweta Arora as Deputy Registrar, subject to the verification of the documents from Baba Farid University of Health Sciences, at Vice Chancellor's level.

It was further **RESOLVED** that the appointment cases of other employees (teaching and non-teaching) approval of which were withheld because of these cases (Ref. EC Meeting Item No. **Item No EC:10:2014:16**) be approved with effect from their respective dates of appointments.

The Secretary presented the recommendations/proceedings of the Sixth Meeting of Academic Council and proposed to be approved.

The Committee **RESOLVED** to approve as such the recommendations of Sixth Meeting of Academic Council held on 5.3.2015, item No. AC:6:2015:14 1 to 7.

Item No. EC:14:2015:3C

Choice based Credit System to be followed from Academic Session 2015-16.

The Secretary presented the matter before the Council for consideration and approval to adopt Choice based Credit System to be followed from Academic Session 2015-16.

The Chairman shared that the University Grants Commission (UGC) has initiated several measures to bring equity, efficiency and excellence in the Higher Education System of country. The UGC has therefore formulated various regulations and guidelines from time to time to improve the higher education system and maintain minimum standards and quality across the Higher Educational Institutions (HEIs) in India.

While the HEIs must have the flexibility and freedom in designing the examination and evaluation methods that best fits the curriculum, syllabi and teaching-learning methods, there is a need to devise a sensible system for awarding the grades based on the performance of students. Presently the performance of the students is reported using the conventional system of marks secured in the examinations or grades or both.

The conversion from marks to letter grades and the letter grades used vary widely across the HEIs in the country. This creates difficulty for the academia and the employers to

understand and infer the performance of the students graduating from different universities and colleges based on grades.

The grading system is considered to be better than the conventional marks system and hence it has been followed in the top institutions in India and abroad. So it is desirable to introduce uniform grading system. This will facilitate student mobility across institutions within and across countries and also enable potential employers to assess the performance of students. To bring in the desired uniformity, in grading system and method for computing the **cumulative grade point average (CGPA)** based on the performance of students in the examinations, the UGC has formulated these guidelines.

The Vice Chancellor further informed the Council that during the Conference of the Vice Chancellors held on 4-5 Feb 2015 at Rashtrapati Bhavan, New Delhi, it was recommended that Choice Based Credit System must be implemented from the academic year 2015-16 in all the Central Universities.

Accordingly, it is proposed to adopt Choice Based Credit System from Academic Session 2015-16 as per UGC Guidelines on Adoption of Choice Based Credit System.

The Chairman informed that this item was considered by the Academic Council vide **Item No. AC:6:2015:4** and the Committee suggested that this should be implemented strictly as per UGC rules.

The Vice Chancellor directed the Secretary, that in future, complete details should be attached with the item which is considered and recommended by the Academic Council.

After discussions, the Committee **RESOLVED** to approve the recommendations of Academic Council to implement the Choice Based Credit System from Academic Session 2015-16.

Item No. EC:14:2015:4C

To take approval regarding rounding off the WAM in existing system and implementation of 10 Point scale system w.e.f. next academic session i.e. 2015-16.

The Secretary brought to the notice of the EC members the matter of rounding off Weighted Average Marks (WAM) in existing system and implementation of 10 Point scale system.

He explained that vide Clause 6.1 (ii) of UGC Guidelines on Adoption of Choice Based Credit System, the UGC recommended all Central Universities to adopt 10 point grading system with the following letter grades:

After discussions, the Council **RESOLVED** to approve the WAM in existing system and implementation of 10 Point scale system as per the UGC guidelines from academic session 2015-16

To consider minor amendment in the Rules and Regulations for M.Phil.-Ph.D. Integrated Programme already approved vide item No. AC:3:2012:13.4 in the Third Meeting of the Academic Council held on 10.03.2012.

The Secretary informed the Council that vide **Item No. AC:6:2015:6**, of the 6th meeting of Academic Council dated 5.3.2015, recommended minor amendment in the Rules and Regulations for M.Phil. – Ph.D. Integrated Programme. He requested that this amendment may be allowed:

The Council considered the recommendation of the AC as stated above and **RESOLVED** to approve the minor amendments in the Rules and Regulations for M.Phil.-Ph.D. Integrated Programme and allowed its implementation forthwith.

Item No. EC:14:2015:6C

To confirm the proceedings of the meeting of the Committee constituted to frame the rules for awarding the Gold Medal and Merit Certificate.

The Secretary brought to the notice of the Council that a Committee was constituted to frame the rules for awarding the Gold Medals and Merit Certificates to the meritorious students.

He further stated that the item was considered and discussed by the Academic Council (**6th meeting Item No. AC:6:2015:7**) which recommended the following rules and regulations governing the award of Gold Medal and Merit Certificate with an amendment that "if more than one student is eligible for Gold Medal, both will get the Medal of same size and specifications".

He proposed to approve the proceedings of the Academic Council in this regard.

The Council **RESOLVED** to approve the following recommendations of the Academic Council for awarding the Gold Medal and Merit Certificate to the students of CUPB:

1. The student should have secured highest OWAM/OGPA in his/her programme but not less than OWAM of 75.
2. OWAM of two or more student are same then OWAM will be calculated in decimal Point.
3. If OWAM as calculated in point 2 above also happens to be same then gold medal will be shared among such students.
4. To be eligible for gold medal, a student must have passed in each paper in first attempt i.e. has not taken any re-appear or supplementary examination. The student should have not repeated any course.
5. In case a student has taken improvement examination, his/her marks before the improvement will be considered for awarding of gold medal.

6. Any student found indulged in misconduct, indiscipline or ragging or have been rusticated/suspended/expelled will not be eligible award of gold medal.
7. The student must have passed the programme in minimum stipulated time i.e. has not availed extension of one or more semester.
8. The gold medal shall be made of 9 carat gold weighing 15-20 grams. On one side the insignia of the university and of the other the name of the student, year of completion of the programme shall be inscribed.

To consider the list of students to whom degrees are to be awarded in the First Convocation of the University.

During discussion, the Vice Chancellor shared with the members of EC that vide directions from the worthy Chancellor, the university had written letters to the MHRD and the Secretary of the Visitor requesting for an appointment for extending a formal invitation to His Excellency, Shri Pranab Mukherjee, Hon'ble President of India to visit our university for laying the foundation stone of new campus and be Chief Guest of the First Convocation Ceremony of the university. He shared that on 11th March at 3:00 p.m. he had met Madam Omita Paul, Secretary to the Hon'ble President of India, in her office in Rashtrapati Bhavan to request for some early date for the visit of the Visitor. She acceded to the request and consented to work out for an early date for the visit. The EC appreciated the efforts.

The Council **RESOLVED** to approve the list of students as per *Annexure 7* for the award of degree in the first convocation of the university.

In addition it was further **RESOLVED** that the students who will complete the degree programme till the date of convocation should also be included.

Item No. EC:14:2015:8C

To approve the Rules and Regulations for Ph.D. programme.

The Secretary brought to the notice of the Council that there is a requirement of Rules and Regulations for stand-alone Ph.D. programme.

He also shared that till date we have M.Sc./M.A.-M.Phil.-Ph.D. integrated programme. Since it is a new university with limited faculty and infrastructure and the courses are of different duration, we on the recommendations of AC **Item No. AC:6:2015:9** have introduced standalone Ph.D. programme to attract meritorious budding students. For such students we have no Rules/Regulations in place so far. The issue was discussed in the faculty and the AC. The later, vide item No. **AC:6:2015:9** in its meeting dated 5.3.2015 considered the issue and recommended to follow the UGC regulations to govern Ph.D. programme.

The Academic Council **approved** to recommend the Rules and Regulations for Ph.D. programme as per *Annexure 8*.

After deliberations, the Executive Council **RESOLVED** to approve the Rules and Regulations for standalone Ph.D. programme as recommended by the AC (6th meeting vide item No. **AC:6:2015:9**) and conforming with the UGC rules.

Item No. EC:14:2015:9C

To consider transfer of the M.A. Sociology programme from the Centre of South and Central Asian Studies to the Centre for Social Studies in the School for Social Sciences.

The Secretary requested the members to consider the recommendations of the AC (6th meeting dated 5.3.2015 **Item No. AC:6:2015:10**) for transfer of the M.A. Sociology programme from the Centre of South and Central Asian Studies to the Centre for Social Studies in the School for Social Sciences.

He brought to the notice of the EC that it was placed before the august body for consideration and approval of the recommendations of the Academic Council (**Item No. AC:6:2015:10.**)

The Council after discussion **RESOLVED** to approve the transfer of the M.A. Sociology programme from the Centre of South and Central Asian Studies in the School for Social Sciences to the Centre for Social Studies under the same School for Social Sciences.

Item No. EC:14:2015:10C

To consider the start of the Ph.D. programmes.

The Secretary informed the Council that on the recommendations of the Academic Council (6th meeting

dated 5.3.2015 Item No. AC:6:2015:11) university plans to start the following courses :

- a) Ph.D. in Comparative Literature
- b) Ph.D. in Economics

The Chairman shared with the members that there is a requirement of standalone Ph.D. programmes. The matter was placed before the Academic Council vide Item No. AC:6:2015:11, where it was recommended to the EC for its approval

After discussion, the Council **RESOLVED** to approve the start of Ph.D. programmes in Comparative Literature and Economics, as recommended by the AC.

Item No.EC:14:2015:11C

To consider the start of new Courses

While presenting the item the Secretary informed the members that on the recommendations of the Academic Council (6th meeting dated 5.3.2015 Item No. AC:6:2015:12) the university plans to start following new courses whenever possible with 15 seats each in various streams from academic session 2015-16:

- a) M.A. in Hindi
- b) Ph.D. in Hindi
- c) M.A. in Music
- d) M.A. in Fine Arts
- e) M.A. in Theatre
- f) M.A. in Philosophy
- g) M.A. in Sociology
- h) M.Sc. in Earth and Geological Sciences
- i) M.Sc. in Physical Education and Sports Science

The members appreciated and **RESOLVED** to approve recommendations of the AC to start the proposed new courses with 15 seats in each from academic session 2015-16.

Item No.EC:14:2015:12C

To consider appointments of the renowned educationists as Visiting Professor/ Adjunct Professor

The Secretary requested the Council to consider the appointments of renowned educationists as Visiting Professor/Adjunct Professor.

The Chairman shared that MHRD and the Visitor during interaction with the VCs of the Central Universities had suggested/recommended the appointments of Visiting Professors/Adjunct Professors from India and abroad for short durations for providing leadership.

The Chairman also suggested the members that some senior educationists/academicians from India and abroad who can contribute a lot in Academic pursuits of the university in different fields and can guide the junior faculty for development of the university in various academic fronts are urgently required. The appointment of Visiting Faculty will add to the ranking of the university as well.

He shared that the Academic Council has recommended some names as per **Annexure 9**, which is not complete.

He shared that the university will approach the Fellows/Experts from official national academies INSA, IAS, NASI, NAAS, ICSSR and Sahitya Academy and well known scientists from India and abroad who may be appointed as Visiting Professors to deliver the lectures as per their availability. The Visiting Professor as appointed could be given TA/DA and honorarium for delivering the lectures as per rules. To those such Visiting/Adjunct Professors from abroad, TA/DA from travel within India in addition to the honorarium shall be payable.

The members appreciated and **RESOLVED** to approve the appointments of the Visiting Professors/Adjunct Professors as per the list recommended by Academic Council and from among the Fellows of any of the official Academies i.e. INSA, IAS, NASI, NAAS, ICSSR and SAs and well known scientist from India and abroad as deemed fit by the Vice-Chancellor.

Item No EC:14:2015:13C

To consider grant of dislocation allowance to the Non-teaching staff.

The Secretary brought to the notice of the Council the matter of Dislocation allowance to non teaching staff which was approved by the Executive Council in its Eleventh Meeting and has also been notified vide No: CUPB/CC/14/EC-11/4664 dated 22.12.2014. However, the same has been allowed w.e.f. 1st December 2014.

This dislocation allowance in favour of faculty was approved by the Executive Council which was notified vide No: CUPB/CC/13/00/1601 dated 03.12.2013.

The Chairman informed the members that in case of approval of Dislocation Allowance for faculty members, no date was mentioned from which it has to come into force. However, in case of Dislocation Allowance for Non-teaching staff the date has been fixed as 01.12.2014 due to which approximately 5/6 employees who had joined the University before 01.12.2014 are not able to avail of the Dislocation Allowance.

Now, two non-teaching employees had submitted the representation which were brought to the notice of the EC with following contents for information and consideration:

- **Mr. Rajinder Kalra, Assistant Registrar (Examinations)**

"The Dislocation Allowance has been recommended to all the non-teaching staff of the university w.e.f. 01-12-2014.

In this regard it is submitted that undersigned has joined this esteemed university on 19-12-2013 whereas I shifted my residence and family on 30th June 2014. Previously I was residing at CDLU-Sirsa in Haryana state.

In view of above Dislocation allowance may kindly be granted to the undersigned".

"It is in reference to application dated 13.01.2015 regarding condoning the delay for claiming dislocation allowance.

It is submitted that dislocation allowance to non-teaching staff has been approved by the Executive Council and has also been notified vide no: CUPB/CC/14/EC-11/4664 dated: 22/12/2014. However the same has been allowed w.e.f. 1st December 2014.

In view of the above, it is submitted that we may put up the matter in forthcoming Executive Council meeting requesting the council to allow all the regular non-teaching staff who have joined before 01.12.2014 approximately 6 in numbers to avail the Dislocation Allowance so to maintain the parity within staff".

It was submitted to the Executive Council to consider the request of regular non-teaching staff who had joined before 01.12.2014 to avail of the Dislocation Allowance so as to maintain the parity within staff.

After considering the representation and discussion the EC expressed regret that for technical reasons the allowance cannot be allowed retrospectively. Application of rules retrospectively is bad in law.

The members **RESOLVED** not to allow application of dislocation allowance retrospectively.

To Consider XII Five Year Plan Allocation/Action Plan (Budget Estimates/Revised Estimates).

The Secretary brought to the notice of the members of the Executive Council about the Revised Budget Estimates for XII Five Year Plan Allocation/Action Plan (as expected upto 31st March 2015)

This matter was put to the Finance Committee in its Eighth Meeting on 16.3.2015 vide item No. **Item No. FC:8:2015:4** and their recommendations/discussions are as follows:

Prof. P. Ramarao brought to notice of the members that UGC allocated total outlay of Rs. 333.5 Crores under XII plan. The existing balance was Rs. 24.117 Crores from the XI plan.

Of the total outlay allocated in 12th Plan, Rs. 160 crore has been received by the university. A bank interest of Rs. 10.25 Crores has been earned. In addition Rs. 71.58.46 lacs has been earned as receipts and fee etc.

As regards expenditure, in nutshell, the available funds with the university were Rs. 195.08 crores while the expenditure have been 135.58 crores and balance of Rs. 59.50 crores. This includes committed expenditure on the items for which the orders have already been placed. In some cases material has already been received. A sum of Rs. 40.87 Crores is to be released to EIL as 30% of project cost i.e. 136.22 Crores, as per agreement. Conclusively, over 71.27% of the XII Five Year Plan has been utilized. He further expressed the need of **Rs. 115 Crores** to meet the expenditure on construction of VC residence, VC office, Registrar's Office, Boys and Girls Hostels and roads.

He shared that construction activities had to be postponed for relevant reasons like non-availability of Vice Chancellor, lack of approvals of maps and other mandatory approvals. In the meantime because of cost escalation the funds became less than the required cost. The university had to cancel the construction of residence of Vice Chancellor, senior officers, office of the Vice Chancellor and office of the Registrar even senior faculty residences for the reasons of paucity of funds. He also shared since the main campus of the university is 25 kms away from the city and for retaining the expert faculty, we would require some small school and commercial area on the campus. We are also committed to the solar power because of site constraints. He shared that the issue was discussed in the FC in its meeting dated 16.3.2015 where in principle it was approved for consideration in the EC for its further approval. The approval

of EC is required for submitting the request to the UGC. He shared that Shri K.P. Singh, a member of FC from UGC expressed that the revision of allocation of funds at this juncture may be difficult by UGC. He also expressed that revision within the allocated budget is possible.

After discussion and based on recommendations of the Finance Committee the Executive Council approved the item and recommended to the UGC for revising the allocation of funds by including Rs. 115 Crores for the next 2 years i.e. 2015-16 and 2016-17 of the 12th plan. It was **RESOLVED** that full justification with individual details including the order of priority for allocation of additional funds be sent to the UGC, New Delhi.

To consider Earn While You Learn (EWYL) Scheme for the students

The Secretary shared with the members that the university encourages the students to take up part-time jobs at the university to make them independent under the "Earn While You Learn" scheme on campus to make the students self-reliant and develop their creativity and skills during their stay on the campus.

He also shared that this matter was put up before the Finance Committee in its Eighth meeting on 16.3.2015 vide **item No. FC:8:2015:5** where it was appreciated and approved to recommend to EC for approval, in case the university expects it to be sustainable without the governmental grant.

The Council **RESOLVED** to approve the start of Earn While You Learn Scheme (EWYL) in the university as per recommendations of FC.

To consider the payment of Rs. 40.87 Crore to be released to Engineers India Limited (EIL).

The Secretary brought before the members the Executive Council for consideration and permission to release the payment of Rs. 40.87 Crores as 30% of the phase Ia layout to Engineers India Limited (EIL) for starting construction on the university campus.

He also told that the item was put up before the Finance Committee vide **Item No. FC:8:2015:6** in its 8th meeting dated 16.3.2015.

He brought to the notice of the members following clauses of the approved agreement between the CUP and EIL, which was recommended to EC for permission.

1. Clause 9.5 of the agreement with the EIL (PMC)

“The CLIENT shall deposit 30% (Thirty percent) of the estimated tender cost in the account as initial deposit before award of any execution/procurement contract. PMC shall not finance the PROJECT at any stage or assume liability in the form of execution or commitment”.

2. Clause 9.3 of the agreement provides that

“PMC shall open and maintain a separate interest bearing account for the PROJECT in any of the Nationalized Banks in the name of the university”.

Annexure-12

3. Clause 9.6 provides that

“PMC shall invest the above deposits in the form of fixed deposits in the university account with the permission of the CLIENT and the interest of deposit will be credited to this account”.

The Vice Chancellor shared that some amount is also pending for payment to the Architect.

The detailed discussions were held on this item in the FC meeting on 16.3.2015, the members have given some suggestions which were agreed to.

During discussion, one of the honourable members brought to the notice of the EC, a letter from one of the tenderers (annexure 12) received by him stating that some of the clauses of the tender document which according to him were harsh.

The Chairman clarified that the tender document was prepared by the EIL (Project Management Consultant) in consultation with Building Advisory Committee as per the MoU between EIL and CUPB.

In the pre-bid meeting at Gurgaon which was attended by Engineering experts from CUPB, there was some discussion between tenderers and the EIL which was resolved there. At this stage interfering in the process and diluting the clauses already announced would be legally bad and result in delay in the execution of construction.

Er. Shamlal Garg advised to take an expert opinion, if required, in this matter so that the necessary corrective measures may be taken so that the execution of the project may not suffer.

The Chairman agreed to send the representation to the EIL for their comments and the needful as per law.

After discussion, the Executive Council **RESOLVED** to deport Rs. 40.87 Crores in the ESCROW account for execution of the project by EIL as per the recommendation of the FC vide item No. **Item No. FC:8:2015:6.**

To consider the regular appointment of Faculty in the Centre for Education

The Secretary informed the Council to consider the regular appointments of Faculty in the Centre for Education.

The Vice Chancellor shared with the members of the Council that interviews for the post of Professor advertised vide Advt. No. T-NT-01 (2014) and for the post of Associate Professor vide Advt. No. T-03 (2014) and T-NT-01 (2014) in the Centre for Education were conducted on 21st February 2015.

The Proceedings of the same in sealed envelopes after opening were placed on the table.

The following candidate is selected for the position as mentioned below:

Professor:

Dr. Surinderjit Kaur Bawa is selected for the post of Professor for one year extendable by another year at pay as per rules i.e. with protection of pay she is currently drawing.

Associate Professor:

None found suitable for the post of Associate Professor.

After discussion on the proceedings, the Council RESOLVED to approve the appointment of Dr. Surinderjit Kaur Bawa as Professor for one year, extendable by another one year on salary as per rules, in the Centre for Education of the university.

Women candidates are eligible for maternity leave of 180 days at full rates of fellowship once during the tenure of their award. Beside this an 'Intermittent Break' for a maximum period of 2 years may also be permissible to the women candidates. This Flexi Time Period should not be counted towards the tenure of the fellowship and effectively the total period of fellowship should remain the same" (copy of rule enclosed).

It was informed that the recommendations were considered by the AC in its 6th meeting on 5.3.2015 vide item No. **AC:6:2015:14.5** and resolved to recommend to the EC to approve them as per guidelines of the UGC.

The Council considered and **RESOLVED** to approve the recommendations of the Academic Council in its meeting dated 5.3.2015 regarding Maternity Leave Rules for Ph.D. students, strictly as per UGC guidelines.

He has worked at the prestigious institutions such as Australian National University, Canberra, Swedish University of Agricultural Sciences, Uppsala and University of California, Davis.

He has also received several professional Awards such as Noel Deerr Award conferred by his Excellency President A.P.J. Abdul Kalam; J. J. Chinoy Award from Indian Society for Plant Physiology and Y.S. Murti Award from Indian Botanical Society.

He further shared that IPR Cell and Innovator Cell have been set up in the University. Dr. Ashok K. Dhawan has also an experience of IPR Cell. Therefore, it is suggested that application of Dr. Ashok K. Dhawan be considered for appointment as an **Invited Professor** to get the benefits from his vast experience and leadership.

After discussions, the Council considered the clause 19(1), schedule (II) of the Central Universities Act and **RESOLVED** to approve the appointment of Dr. Ashok K. Dhawan as a Invited Professor initially for a period of 6 months on applicable salary. i.e. his last pay drawn minus full pension or Rs. 1 lac per month (whichever is less). It was further **RESOLVED** that the period can be extended by another 6 months, if needed.

Jindal who has a vast experience in financial matters as Additional Director in Finance Department of Punjab has applied for the post of Finance Officer in the University. He was also associated with development of Integrated Financial Management System (IFMS) and Employees & Pensioner Database Project (EPDP).

Therefore, it is suggested that application of Mr. S. K. Jindal be considered for appointment as Officer on Special Duty (Finance) to get the benefits in financial matters from his vast experience and leadership.

After discussions, the EC **RESOLVED** to approve the appointment of Mr. S.K. Jindal for one year or till the post of Finance Officer is filled up on regular basis, whichever is earlier on salary as per rules i.e. his last pay drawn minus full pension.

It was further **RESOLVED** to look into for a suitable person for appointment as an Audit Officer in the university to maintain desired transparency of accounts as soon as possible.

The Vice Chancellor explained that the purpose of this MoU is to promote cooperation between two organizations in the field of education and research and development of cooperative efforts to enhance the academic interchange between the two institutions.

The Council **RESOLVED** to approve the signing of MoU with Rural Research and Industrial Development, Chandigarh as per *Annexure 17*.

23.2C

List of experts for faculty and administrative positions

The Vice Chancellor informed the Council that the list of Visitor's Nominees for faculty as well as administrative positions has been received by the university.

He also informed that the application received for the post of Registrar and Controller of Examinations have been

scrutinized. For conducting the interviews for these posts a selection committee is to be constituted by the EC. He shared that two members of the EC were approved in 12th meeting dated 9.12.2014 vide Item No EC:12:2014:5.3. As per rules, in addition of two EC members, the selection committee needs one expert from outside the university. He suggested that some senior/retired well known persons like the following should also be considered:

1. Prof. K. N. Pathak, Professor Emeritus & Former Vice-Chancellor, Panjab University, Chandigarh.
2. Prof. R.P. Bambah, Professor Emeritus, Former Vice Chancellor, Panjab University, Chandigarh.
3. Prof. S.S. Boparai, Former Vice Chancellor, Punjabi University, Patiala.
4. Prof. H.S. Soch, Former Vice Chancellor, Guru Nanak Dev University, Amritsar.

After discussion, it was **RESOLVED** that any one expert out of the above mentioned names be called as expert for the interview which be fixed as early as possible but as per the convenience of Visitors' Nominee.

The Chairman stressed and prayed that the experts for the task of selecting faculty position should be of high academic standards who can't be influenced by external pressures and recommendations.

He further admitted that the list of suggested subject experts earlier approved by the EC for selection of faculty positions is insufficient, because they are only the members of Executive Bodies of INSA. As they are very senior people they might not be available for selecting junior level faculty positions.

He further stated that the Academic Council in its 6th meeting dated 5.3.2015 has recommended that the subject experts should, as far as possible, be well known and be the Fellows of any of the official Academies in India i.e. Indian National Science Academy, New Delhi, Academy of Sciences, Allahabad, Indian Academy of Sciences, Bangalore, National Academy of Agricultural Sciences, New Delhi, Indian Council of Social Sciences Research, New Delhi and Sahitya Academy. He reiterated that the subject experts should be such, who could not be influenced or yield to pressures or recommendations.

He further stated that depending upon the subject specialization the recommended experts as far as possible should not be less than the Fellows of any of the official academies.

Appreciating the request of the Chairman it was unanimously **RESOLVED** to accept and approve the suggestions of the Vice Chancellor. For selecting the faculty the Vice Chancellor was authorised to invite subject experts who are Fellows of the Academies (as far as possible) or even non-fellows in rare cases where he so deems fit.

23.3C

To consider the award of Honorary Degree to the renowned academician.

The Vice Chancellor shared the idea of awarding a doctoral degree (*Honoris Causa*) to one/two or more people of academic leadership or wait for a few years.

After discussions, it was unanimously **RESOLVED** to postpone this matter to the next year for time being.

23.4C

To consider the participation of university in Central Universities Common Entrance Test (CUCET-2015)

The Vice Chancellor shared that on the lines of earlier desire of the MHRD, the university is thinking of participating in the Central Universities Common Entrance Test (CUCET-2015) for the admissions of upcoming academic session 2015-16, being coordinated by Central University of Rajasthan.

He also informed the committee that the CUCET in 2013 was also organized by Central University of Rajasthan in which CUP also participated. He explained that there was more of fiasco, unfortunately. The CUP had contributed Rs. 15 lac. The balance from the participating fee which is **Rs. 10.00 Lacs (approx.)**, has not been remitted so far.

After discussions, the Committee suggested that the university may participate in the CUCET-2015 but the fresh payment be released only after the receipt back of the previous balance amount **Rs.10.00 Lacs (approx.)** with detail of expenditure be from the CU Rajasthan.

The Committee **RESOLVED** to approve the participation of university in the CUCET-2015 and **FURTHER RESOLVED** that the university may also follow its own mechanism for filling up the vacant seats as per the Central Universities Act.

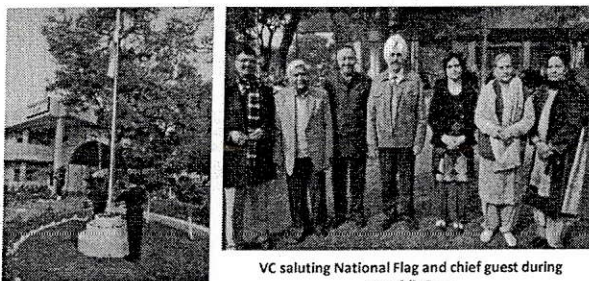

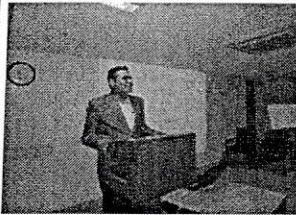

Item No. AC:6:2015:4 **Choice based Credit System to be followed from Academic Session 2015-16.**

The Secretary presented the matter before the Council for consideration and approval to adopt Choice based Credit System to be followed from Academic Session 2015-16.

The Chairman shared that the University Grants Commission (UGC) has initiated several measures to bring equity, efficiency and excellence in the Higher Education System of country. The UGC has therefore formulated various regulations and guidelines from time to time to improve the higher education system and maintain minimum standards and quality across the Higher Educational Institutions (HEIs) in India.

While the HEIs must have the flexibility and freedom in designing the examination and evaluation methods that best fits the curriculum, syllabi and teaching-learning methods, there is a need to devise a sensible system for awarding the grades based on the performance of students. Presently the performance of the students is reported using the conventional system of marks secured in the examinations or grades or both.

The conversion from marks to letter grades and the letter grades used vary widely across the HEIs in the country. This creates difficulty for the academia and the employers to understand and infer the performance of the students graduating from different universities and colleges based on grades.

The grading system is considered to be better than the conventional marks system and hence it has been followed in the top institutions in India and abroad. So it is desirable to introduce uniform grading system. This will facilitate student mobility across institutions within and across countries and also enable potential employers to assess the performance of students. To bring in the desired uniformity, in grading system and method for computing the **cumulative grade point average (CGPA)** based on the performance of students in the examinations, the UGC has formulated these guidelines.

The Vice Chancellor further informed the Council that during the Conference of the Vice Chancellors held on 4-5 Feb 2015 at Rashtrapati Bhavan, New Delhi, it was recommended that Choice Based Credit System must be implemented from the academic year 2015-16 in all the Central Universities.

Accordingly, it is proposed to adopt Choice Based Credit System from Academic Session 2015-16 as per UGC Guidelines on Adoption of Choice Based Credit System.

The Council **RESOLVED** to recommend the Choice based Credit System to be followed from Academic Session 2015-16.

The Secretary brought to the notice of the Academic Council that a Committee was constituted to frame the rules for awarding the Gold Medals and Merit Certificates to the meritorious students.

The Council **RESOLVED** to approve the following recommendations of the committee and recommend the EC for its approval:

Annexure 5

1. The student should have secured highest OWAM/OGPA in his/her programme but not less than OWAM of 75.
2. OWAM of two or more student are same then OWAM will be calculated in decimal Point.
3. If OWAM as calculated in point 2 above also happens to be same then gold medal will be shared among such students.
4. To be eligible for gold medal, a student must have passed in each paper in first attempt i.e. has not taken any re-appear or supplementary examination. The student should have not repeated any course.
5. In case a student has taken improvement examination, his/her marks before the improvement will be considered for awarding of gold medal.
6. Any student found indulged in misconduct, indiscipline or ragging or have been rusticated/suspended/expelled will not be eligible award of gold medal.
7. The student must have passed the programme in minimum stipulated time i.e. has not availed extension of one or more semester.
8. The gold medal shall be made of 9 carat gold weighing 15-20 grams. On one side the insignia of the university and of the other the name of the student, year of completion of the programme shall be inscribed.

The Council **FURTHER** suggested that if more than one student is eligible for Gold Medal, both will get the Medal of same size and specifications as recommended in the proceedings of the internal committee. It further approved the names of students from different courses of the batches 2009-10, 2010-11, 2011-12 and 2012-13 wherever applicable as per the list (annexure-6)

The Council after discussion **RESOLVED** to approve to recommend to the EC the transfer of the M.A. Sociology programme from the Centre of South and Central Asian Studies in the School for Social Sciences to the Centre for Social Studies under the same School for Social Sciences.

Item No. AC:6:2015:11

To start the Ph.D. programme in the following:

- a) Ph.D. in Comparative Literature
- b) Ph.D. in Economics

The Secretary requested the Council that the university plans to start the Ph.D. programme in (a) Comparative Literature and (b) Economics.

The Chairman shared with the members that there is a requirement of standalone Ph.D. programmes.

After discussions, the Council unanimously **RESOLVED** to approve to recommend to the Executive Council to start the Ph.D. programme in the above mentioned courses - Ph.D. in Comparative Literature and Ph.D. in Economics.

Item No. AC:6:2015:12

To approve the starting of new courses.

While presenting the item the Secretary requested the members to consider the start of following new courses whenever possible with 15 seats each in various streams from academic session 2015-16.

- a) M.A. in Hindi
- b) Ph.D. in Hindi

- d) M.A. in Fine Arts
- e) M.A. in Theatre
- f) M.A. in Philosophy
- g) M.A. in Sociology
- h) M.Sc. in Earth and Geological Sciences
- i) M.Sc. in Physical Education and Sports Science

The Vice Chancellor expressed the need to start these courses in view of their and balanced development of the university, w.e.f. the next session i.e. 2015-16.

The Council **RESOLVED** to approve and recommend the start of the above proposed new courses with 15 seats in each from academic session 2015-16.

Item No. AC:6:2015:13 To consider appointments of the renowned educationists as Visiting Professor.

The Secretary requested the Council to consider the appointments of renowned educationists as Visiting Professors/Adjunct Professors.

The Chairman also suggested the members that some senior educationists/academicians from India and abroad who can contribute a lot in Academic pursuits of the university in different fields and can guide the junior faculty for development of the university in various academic fronts are urgently required. The appointment of Visiting Faculty will add to the ranking of the university as well.

The Vice Chancellor explained the members that the university is in process to start two year M.Ed. program from the academic session 2015-16. In view of NCTE Regulations 2014 notified vide letter No. 51-1(2014)-NCTE (N&S) dated 28.11.2014 (copy enclosed), the sanction for the following faculty is required from UGC/MHRD, in addition to the present faculty in the Centre for Education:

It was also informed to the members that in the agenda **Item No AC:6:2015:14.3**, due to typographical error "*non-functional Centres*" was wrongly written as "*Non functional Courses*". The same may please be read as "**Non-functional Centres**" forthwith. The correction was allowed.

It is proposed that the sanction of faculty positions in each of the above mentioned Centres (*Professor 1, Associate Professor – 2 and Assistant Professor – 4*) be utilized as faculty in new courses to be introduced in academic session 2015-16. The university may be allowed to send proposal to the UGC, New Delhi, in this regard so that the same may be implemented at the earliest.

He also requested that in lieu of the above non-functional Centres the new courses be approved and resources allowed to be utilized. The AC **RESOLVED** to approve the re-nomenclature of the Centres at CUPB placed at **Annexure-11** and accordingly recommend new courses/centres as per Annexure-11.

The Secretary brought to the notice of the Council that in view of the UGC letter dated 22.8.2014 regarding the establishment of Centre of Hindi under 12th Five Year plan, the university plans to establish the Centre for Hindi and has sent proposal to UGC on 9.2.2015.

Item No AC:6:2015:14.5 To consider the proceedings of the Meeting of the Committee constituted to look into the Maternity Leave Rules of the University for Ph.D. Students.

The Secretary requested the members to look into the Maternity Leave Rules of the University for Ph.D. Students. He stated that for framing these rules the Vice Chancellor had constituted a committee which made the following recommendations.

The observations and recommendations of the committee as also the UGC Rules which says "*JRFs are entitled for a maximum period of 30 days of leave in a year in addition to public holidays. They are not entitled to any other vacations. Women candidates are eligible for maternity leave of 180 days at full rates of fellowship once during the tenure of their award. Beside this an 'Intermittent Break' for a maximum period of 2 years may also be permissible to the women candidates. This Flexi Time Period should not be counted towards the tenure of the fellowship and effectively the total period of fellowship should remain the same*" (copy of rule enclosed).

The Council considered and **RESOLVED** to recommend that the Maternity Leave Rules for Ph.D. students, should be followed strictly as per UGC guidelines.

Item No AC:6:2015:14.6 To consider the start of following certificate courses under region relevant B.Voc programmes:

- a) Vermiculture technology
- b) Sericulture technology
- c) Apiary
- d) Food Processing
- e) Typing and Shorthand

The Secretary informed the Council that on the initiative and suggestion of UGC, the university plans to start Bachelor of Vocational (B.Voc.) programmes initially in the above mentioned sectors, if possible.

The Chairman shared with the members that during the Conference of the Vice Chancellor's held on 4th-5th February 2015 at Rashtrapati Bhawan, New Delhi, it was discussed that B.Voc. programmes must be introduced by all the CUs to promote the skill development in the country/region.

After discussions, the Council also suggested that following courses under B.Voc. programme may also be included to attract good number of candidates from the region:

- a) Animation
- b) Hardware (Motor binding, TV repair, Mobile repair)
- c) Origami (Japanese Paper Arrangement)
- d) Office Secrecy (Academic Administration)
- e) Polyhouse
- f) Bio fertilizer
- g) Bio pesticides

There were apprehensions that these courses are so small to match 3 year study. It was suggested that to attract adequate number of students to make them viable, we could think of clubbing complimentary traits. In the alternative, instead of 3 year B.VOC. programme, we can try short part-time courses like Certificate Courses for campus students or from anywhere irrespective of age or academic background at a very nominal fee. For this, infrastructure and suitable faculty/experts will have to be employed.

The Council **RESOLVED** to recommend to the EC to approve for the time being initiation of the certificate courses (part-time) proposed by the university and **FURTHER RESOLVED** to include the courses suggested by the AC under B.Voc programmes.

Item No AC:6:2015:14.7 To consider the creation of Database of Alumni by the Central Universities under the Alumni involvement initiative of MHRD.

The Secretary explained the Council that during the Conference of Vice Chancellor's held on 4th-5th February 2015, the MHRD has taken as initiative to create the Database of Alumni by all the Central Universities.

The Council **considered and approve** the creation of Database of Alumni by the Central Universities under the Alumni involvement initiative of MHRD as soon as the students will graduate from the University.

Item No AC:6:2015:14.8 To recommend to EC the subject experts for interviewing candidates for faculty positions.

The Secretary requested the Council to recommend names of experts for conducting the interviews for faculty positions in the university.

Initiating discussions, the Chairman brought to the information of the AC that as per the Act & Statutes of the university, section 27 clause 18(2) the constitution of the Selection Committee should have 3 subject experts (for Professor) and 2 experts (for Associate Professor and Assistant Professor) who are not from the university. These experts are to be nominated by the EC from the list of academicians recommended by AC.

The Chairman requested that the experts should be of high academic standards and foresighted visibility in terms of academic pursuits who can't be influenced by external pressures and recommendations for the task of selecting faculty.

He further admitted that the list of suggested subject experts earlier approved by the EC for selection of faculty positions is insufficient, because they are only the members of Executive Bodies of INSA. As they are very senior people they might not be available for selecting junior level faculty positions.

He suggested that the subject experts should be, as far as possible, well known and be the Fellows of any of the official Academies in India i.e. Indian National Science Academy, New Delhi, National Academy of Sciences India Allahabad, Indian Academy of Sciences, Bangalore, National Academy of Agricultural Sciences, New Delhi, Indian Council of Social Sciences Research, New Delhi and Sahitya Academy. He reiterated that the subject experts should be such, who could not be influenced or yield to pressures or recommendations.

Appreciating the request of the Chairman it was unanimously **RESOLVED** to accept the suggestions of the Vice Chancellor and recommend to the EC the names of current Fellows of any of the official National Academies – INSA, IAS, NASI, NAAS, ICSSR, SA and further **RESOLVED** to recommend authorization to the Vice Chancellor to invite any expert depending upon availability.

UGC Guidelines on Adoption of Choice Based Credit System

1. Preamble

The University Grants Commission (UGC) has initiated several measures to bring equity, efficiency and excellence in the Higher Education System of country. The important measures taken to enhance academic standards and quality in higher education include innovation and improvements in curriculum, teaching-learning process, examination and evaluation systems, besides governance and other matters.

The UGC has formulated various regulations and guidelines from time to time to improve the higher education system and maintain minimum standards and quality across the Higher Educational Institutions (HEIs) in India. The academic reforms recommended by the UGC in the recent past have led to overall improvement in the higher education system. However, due to lot of diversity in the system of higher education, there are multiple approaches followed by universities towards examination, evaluation and grading system. While the HEIs must have the flexibility and freedom in designing the examination and evaluation methods that best fits the the curriculum, syllabi and teaching-learning methods, there is a need to devise a sensible system for awarding the grades based on the performance of students. Presently the performance of the students is reported using the conventional system of marks secured in the examinations or grades or both. The conversion from marks to letter grades and the letter grades used vary widely across the HEIs in the country. This creates difficulty for the academia and the employers to understand and infer the performance of the students graduating from different universities and colleges based on grades.

The grading system is considered to be better than the conventional marks system and hence it has been followed in the top institutions in India and abroad. So it is desirable to introduce uniform grading system. This will facilitate student mobility across institutions within and across countries and also enable potential employers to assess the performance of students. To bring in the desired uniformity, in grading system and method for computing the cumulative grade point average (CGPA) based on the performance of students in the examinations, the UGC has formulated these guidelines.

2. Applicability of the Grading System

These guidelines

shall apply to all undergraduate and postgraduate level degree, diploma and certificate programmes under the credit system awarded by the Central, State and Deemed to be universities in India.

3. Definitions of Key Words:

1. **Academic Year:** Two consecutive (one odd + one even) semesters constitute one academic year.
2. **Choice Based Credit System (CBCS):** The CBCS provides choice for students to select from the prescribed courses (core, elective or minor or soft skill courses).
3. **Course:** Usually referred to, as 'papers' is a component of a programme. All courses need not carry the same weight. The courses should define learning objectives and

learning outcomes. A course may be designed to comprise lectures/ tutorials/laboratory work/ field work/ outreach activities/ project work/ vocational training/viva/ seminars/ term papers/assignments/ presentations/ self-study etc. or a combination of some of these.

4. **Credit Based Semester System (CBSS):** Under the CBSS, the requirement for awarding a degree or diploma or certificate is prescribed in terms of number of credits to be completed by the students.
5. **Credit Point:** It is the product of grade point and number of credits for a course.
6. **Credit:** A unit by which the course work is measured. It determines the number of hours of instructions required per week. One credit is equivalent to one hour of teaching (lecture or tutorial) or two hours of practical work/field work per week.
7. **Cumulative Grade Point Average (CGPA):** It is a measure of overall cumulative performance of a student over all semesters. The CGPA is the ratio of total credit points secured by a student in various courses in all semesters and the sum of the total credits of all courses in all the semesters. It is expressed up to two decimal places.
8. **Grade Point:** It is a numerical weight allotted to each letter grade on a 10-point scale.
9. **Letter Grade:** It is an index of the performance of students in a said course. Grades are denoted by letters O, A+, A, B+, B, C, P and F.
10. **Programme:** An educational programme leading to award of a Degree, diploma or certificate.
11. **Semester Grade Point Average (SGPA):** It is a measure of performance of work done in a semester. It is ratio of total credit points secured by a student in various courses registered in a semester and the total course credits taken during that semester. It shall be expressed up to two decimal places.
12. **Semester:** Each semester will consist of 15-18 weeks of academic work equivalent to 90 actual teaching days. The odd semester may be scheduled from July to December and even semester from January to June.
13. **Transcript or Grade Card or Certificate:** Based on the grades earned, a grade certificate shall be issued to all the registered students after every semester. The grade certificate will display the course details (code, title, number of credits, grade secured) along with SGPA of that semester and CGPA earned till that semester.

4. Semester System and Choice Based Credit System

The Indian Higher Education Institutions have been moving from the conventional annual system to semester system. Currently many of the institutions have already introduced the choice based credit system. The semester system accelerates the teaching-learning process and enables vertical and horizontal mobility in learning. The credit based semester system provides flexibility in designing curriculum and assigning credits based on the course content and hours of teaching. The choice based credit system provides a 'cafeteria' type approach in which the students can take courses of their choice, learn at their own pace, undergo additional courses and acquire more than the required credits, and adopt an interdisciplinary approach to learning. It is desirable that the HEIs move to CBCS and implement the grading system.

5. Types of Courses:

Courses in a programme may be of three kinds: Core, Elective and Foundation.

1. Core Course:-

There may be a Core Course in every semester. This is the course which is to be compulsorily studied by a student as a core requirement to complete the requirement of a programme in a said discipline of study.

2. Elective Course:-

Elective course is a course which can be chosen from a pool of papers. It may be:

- Supportive to the discipline of study
- Providing an expanded scope
- Enabling an exposure to some other discipline/domain
- Nurturing student's proficiency/skill.

An elective may be "Generic Elective" focusing on those courses which add generic proficiency to the students. An elective may be "Discipline centric" or may be chosen from an unrelated discipline. It may be called an "Open Elective."

3. Foundation Course:-

The Foundation Courses may be of two kinds: Compulsory Foundation and Elective foundation. "Compulsory Foundation" courses are the courses based upon the content that leads to Knowledge enhancement. They are mandatory for all disciplines. Elective Foundation courses are value-based and are aimed at man-making education.

6. Examination and Assessment

The HEIs are currently following various methods for examination and assessment suitable for the courses and programmes as approved by their respective statutory bodies. In assessing the performance of the students in examinations, the usual approach is to award marks based on the examinations conducted at various stages (sessional, mid-term, end-semester etc.) in a semester. Some of the HEIs convert these marks to letter grades based on absolute or relative grading system and award the grades. There is a marked variation across the colleges and universities in the number of grades, grade points, letter grades used, which creates difficulties in comparing students across the institutions. The UGC recommends the following system to be implemented in awarding the grades and CGPA under the credit based semester system.

6.1. Letter Grades and Grade Points:

- i. Two methods -relative grading or absolute grading- have been in vogue for awarding grades in a course. The relative grading is based on the distribution (usually normal distribution) of marks obtained by all the students of the course and the grades are awarded based on a cut-off marks or percentile. Under the absolute grading, the marks are converted to grades based on pre-determined class intervals. To implement the following grading system, the colleges and universities can use any one of the above methods.
- ii. The UGC recommends a 10-point grading system with the following letter grades as given below:

Table 1: Grades and Grade Points

Letter Grade	Grade Point

- iii. A student obtaining Grade F shall be considered failed and will be required to reappear in the examination.
- iv. For non credit courses 'Satisfactory' or "Unsatisfactory' shall be indicated instead of the letter grade and this will not be counted for the computation of SGPA/CGPA.
- v. The Universities can decide on the grade or percentage of marks required to pass in a course and also the CGPA required to qualify for a degree taking into consideration the recommendations of the statutory professional councils such as AICTE, MCI, BCI, NCTE etc.,
- vi. The statutory requirement for eligibility to enter as assistant professor in colleges and universities in the disciplines of arts, science, commerce etc., is a minimum average mark of 50% and 55% in relevant postgraduate degree respectively for reserved and general category. Hence, it is recommended that the cut-off marks for grade B shall not be less than 50% and for grade B+, it should not be less than 55% under the absolute grading system. Similarly cut-off marks shall be fixed for grade B and B+ based on the recommendation of the statutory bodies (AICTE, NCTE etc.,) of the relevant disciplines.

6.2. Fairness in Assessment:

Assessment is an integral part of system of education as it is instrumental in identifying and certifying the academic standards accomplished by a student and projecting them far and wide as an objective and impartial indicator of a student's performance. Thus, it becomes bounden duty of a University to ensure that it is carried out in fair manner. In this regard, UGC recommends the following system of checks and balances which would enable Universities effectively and fairly carry out the process of assessment and examination.

- i. In case of at least 50% of core courses offered in different programmes across the disciplines, the assessment of the theoretical component towards the end of the semester should be undertaken by external examiners from outside the university conducting examination, who may be appointed by the competent authority. In such courses, the question papers will be set as well as assessed by external examiners.
- ii. In case of the assessment of practical component of such core courses, the team of examiners should be constituted on 50 – 50 % basis. i.e. half of the examiners in the team should be invited from outside the university conducting examination.
- iii. In case of the assessment of project reports / thesis / dissertation etc. the work should be undertaken by internal as well as external examiners.

7. Computation of SGPA and CGPA

The UGC recommends the following procedure to compute the Semester Grade Point Average (SGPA) and Cumulative Grade Point Average (CGPA):

- i. The SGPA is the ratio of sum of the product of the number of credits with the grade points scored by a student in all the courses taken by a student and the sum of the number of credits of all the courses undergone by a student, i.e

$$\text{SGPA } (S_i) = \frac{\sum(C_i \times G_i)}{\sum C_i}$$

where C_i is the number of credits of the i th course and G_i is the grade point scored by the student in the i th course.

- ii. The CGPA is also calculated in the same manner taking into account all the courses undergone by a student over all the semesters of a programme, i.e.

$$\text{CGPA} = \frac{\sum(C_i \times S_i)}{\sum C_i}$$

where S_i is the SGPA of the i th semester and C_i is the total number of credits in that semester.

- iii. The SGPA and CGPA shall be rounded off to 2 decimal points and reported in the transcripts.

8. Illustration of Computation of SGPA and CGPA and Format for Transcripts

- ii. Transcript (Format): Based on the above recommendations on Letter grades, grade points and SGPA and CCPA, the HEIs may issue the transcript for each semester and a consolidated transcript indicating the performance in all semesters.

In this letter UGC has recommended a **10-Points Grading System** for evaluation of the performance of students in the examinations as under:

While implementing 10 point scale system following points may also be considered:

1. Instead of giving marks; grade points and letter grades may be awarded for each course
2. SGPA and CGPA will be denoted up to two decimal points




A meeting of committee to frame rules for awarding gold medals and merit certificates was held on 26-02-2015. The committee has proposed the following rules regarding award of gold medals:


1. The student should have secured highest OWAM/OGPA in his/her programme but not less than OWAM of 75
2. If OWAM of two or more student are same then OWAM will be calculated in decimal points (without rounding-off WAM of each semester.)
3. If OWAM as calculated in Point 2 above; also happens to be same then gold medal will be shared among such students.
4. To be eligible for gold medal, a student must have passed the each paper in first attempt i.e. has not taken any re-appear or supplementary examination. The student should have not repeated any course.
5. In case a student has taken improvement examination, his/her marks before the improvement will be considered for awarding of gold medal.
6. Any student found indulged in misconduct, indiscipline or ragging or have been rusticated/suspended/expelled, will not be eligible for award of gold medal
7. The student must have passed the programme in minimum stipulated time i.e. has not availed extension of one or more semester.
8. The gold medal shall be made of 9 carat gold weighing 15-20 grams. On its one side the insignia of the university and on the other the name of the student, year of completion of the programme shall be inscribed.





Doctor of Philosophy (Ph.D.) Programme
Rules and Regulations
{Sub – section (1) (b) of Section 28 of the Central Universities Act, 2009}

1. TITLE AND COMMENCEMENT

- i. These rules and regulations shall be called the Rules and Regulations of Ph.D. Programme hereinafter referred as the Programme, and shall be applicable to all the Ph.D. programmes unless otherwise stated. These rules and regulations shall come into force with immediate effect.
- ii. The Degree of Doctor of Philosophy (Ph.D.) may be granted in any faculty of the university subject to general guidance of the Academic Council and general control of the school board concerned.

2. DURATION

- i. Unless otherwise provided in the statutes governing Doctor of Philosophy Programme, the minimum duration for completion of each Doctoral Programme shall be 06 semesters (3.0 academic years) and the maximum duration shall be 10 semesters (5 academic years).
- ii. The name of a scholar shall be removed from the rolls of the university if the student fails to submit thesis within five years of the date of registration.
- iii. In respect of candidates who had discontinued for a valid reason and are readmitted to the programme by the School, the period for which such candidates had discontinued shall not be counted towards calculating the period of five years prescribed in clause 2.(i).
- iv. No candidate admitted to this Programme shall undertake any employment or join any other course of study before completing the minimum residency period of 2.0 years.
- v. In case of a foreign student who is compelled to leave the programme in between for getting the student visa extended, such period shall not be counted for the purpose of calculation of duration of the programme.
- vi. A semester/year may be declared a zero semester/year in case of a student could not continue with the programme during that period due to illness, hospitalization, accepting a foreign scholarship/fellowship and joining a government job subject to the fulfilment of requirements as laid down by the relevant rules. Such zero semester/year shall not be counted for calculation of the duration of the programme in case of such a student.

3. NUMBER OF SEATS

- i. The number of seats in each Ph.D. programme shall be as approved by the statutory bodies of the university and will be notified on the university website and in the admission notification to be advertised in leading newspapers.

- ii. The policy of the Government of India and the guidelines of the UGC, regarding reservation of seats for candidates belonging to Scheduled Castes, Scheduled Tribes, OBCs and for differently abled candidates shall be implemented.

4. ADMISSION CRITERIA

- i. Admission of a candidate to the programme would be made only in its first semester. The candidate shall be promoted to subsequent semesters of the programme after completing necessary formalities.
- ii. In exceptional cases lateral entry of a candidate shall be considered for admission to a later semester of the programme on the recommendations of the concerned School Board.
- iii. Foreign nationals residing in India or abroad or Indian nationals residing abroad may be admitted to this programme according to the policy guidelines laid down by the Government of India/statutory bodies of the university from time to time.
- iv. Candidate eligible for admission to the Programme shall not be admitted if already registered for a full time Programme of this university or any other university/institute.
- v. Candidates admitted to the Programme shall be permitted to pursue part-time evening certificate/diploma programmes of professional nature in the university or other institutions.

5. ELIGIBILITY FOR ADMISSION

- i. An applicant possessing any one of the following qualifications shall be eligible to apply for admission to a Ph.D. programme of the University:
- ii. A candidate shall be eligible for admission to the programme in any discipline provided that the candidate has qualified for the award of Masters Degree in the concerned subject or in an allied subject (to be determined by the School Board) of any recognized university or a degree recognized by the university for this purpose as its equivalent with a minimum of 60% marks or its equivalent Grade.
- iii. For SC/ST/OBCs, differentially abled candidates a concession of 5 percent of marks shall be given in the minimum eligibility marks.

6. PROCEDURE FOR ADMISSION

- i. As per academic calendar, the university shall invite applications from eligible candidates for admission to the Programme in each academic session, giving details regarding the academic calendar, number of seats available in each Centre of Study, eligibility criteria, prescribed fees, etc.
- ii. Admission for the Programme shall be advertised in leading national newspapers and also on the university website.
- iii. The admission to the Programme shall be made on the basis of the entrance test to be conducted by the university/or as directed by UGC as per a schedule to be notified for the purpose or through any such criteria as mentioned in the frame of a particular programme or as decided by the statutory bodies of the university.

- iv. The written test shall be followed by a mandatory interview in the form of interaction to be organized by the concerned school. At the time of interview, the candidates are expected to discuss their plan of research in the area of their specialization.
- v. The final merit list will be prepared on the basis of score in entrance test, marks obtained in the interview and their academic record.
- vi. The selected candidates shall submit prescribed fee and other relevant documents to the centre concerned within the stipulated time.
- vii. The admission for the candidates who qualified UGC-CSIR NET with JRF or any other JRF through examination shall be done every semester based on availability of faculty, infrastructure for research and the specializations.
- viii. Permanent teachers/employees in service of the Central University of Punjab or any other recognized university/college/research institute possessing three years experience, shall be considered for admission by the concerned school board if they fulfill the eligibility criteria for admission, selection criteria and granted study leave by the respective employer for a period required to fulfill residency requirements as may be prescribed by the concerned school board.

7. EXEMPTION FROM ENTRANCE TEST

- i. Candidates interested in admission to Ph.D. Programme offered by the university shall appear in the entrance test except the following:
- ii. The candidates who have qualified any national level test such as UGC-CSIR NET/JRF/ICMR -JRF/DBT-JRF/ICAR NET/JRF or GATE/GPAT.
- iii. Candidates who are Teacher Fellowship Holders and direct awardees of fellowship by Department of Science and Technology (INSPIRE), ICMR or any other agency supported by the Government of India.
- iv. In case of disciplines in science and engineering it will be the decision of the Academic Committee of the concerned centre of study to decide whether candidates who have cleared SLET/Ph.D. entrance test without fellowship be admitted to Ph.D. Programme or not.
- v. Sponsored Foreign Students through MEA for doing Ph.D. under any academic exchange programme approved by the Government of India and Degree approved by University equivalence committee.
- vi. Candidates who have passed M.Phil. Programme and admitted through National Level Entrance Test recognised by the U.G.C.
- vii. The candidates exempted from written test must appear in the interview and pursue the programme as per the Rules and Regulations prescribed for the Programme.
- viii. In-service candidates holding permanent/temporary positions shall submit their applications for admission through proper channel.

8. ALLOCATION OF SUPERVISOR

- i. At least one semester before the start of research work every Ph.D. scholar shall be allocated a supervisor as per UGC (Minimum standards and procedure for award of M.Phil./Ph.D. degree) Regulation, 2009 by the concerned Coordinator of the Centre which shall be approved by the concerned Dean of the School and Dean Academic Affairs.

- ii. A Professor or an Associate Professor shall ipso-facto be eligible to become a supervisor. An Assistant Professor, or a researcher from another university or a research organisation recognised for research by the Central University of Punjab under an active Memorandum of Understanding may also become research supervisor/co-supervisor if he/she has published research work to his credit and has minimum three years of teaching/research experience.
- iii. The recognition of a teacher as supervisor/co-supervisor from another organization shall be done on the basis of a written request of the concerned teacher through the head of the organization where he/she is working.
- iv. The supervisor shall be responsible for planning the programme of work of the student including the courses to be taken by him and the schedule of research to be followed.
- v. In the event of supervisor proceeding on long leave/resigning from service or any other such circumstances, the Coordinator of Centre shall supervise the work of the student till completion of the programme or allotment of the student to another supervisor on recommendation of Coordinator of the Centre of Study and Dean of the concerned school. This will require approval of the Dean Academic Affairs.
- vi. A Professor may supervise not more than eight, Associate Professor six and Assistant Professor five Ph.D. scholars at any point of time.
- vii. In case of interdisciplinary nature of research of a scholar, co-supervisor (s) may be appointed, with the approval of the Dean Academic Affairs from within or outside the centre of study in addition to the supervisor but only the supervisor shall be responsible for completing the administrative procedures.

9. PROGRAMME STRUCTURE

- i. The course work of Ph.D. Programme shall consist of 20 credit hours but the scholar may be required to include more courses in case the supervisor feels that the additional courses are important for research work. The courses to be taken by a scholar will be approved by a committee consisting of supervisor, coordinator of the concerned center and Dean of the School. Supervisor shall be the Chairman of the committee. The record of courses to be taken by each scholar shall be maintained in the examination cell.
- ii. A student may be exempted from one or more courses in case the Course Equivalence Committee decides that the student has covered these courses or equivalents in his/her previous programmes.
- iii. After successful completion of course work the candidate shall be recommended for final registration in Ph.D. programme.
- iv. Not later than six months after the provisional registration in Ph.D. programme, the candidate shall deliver an open house seminar on the thesis research proposal (synopsis seminar) to be undertaken by him/her during Ph.D.
- v. A committee consisting of an outside expert, supervisor, coordinator of the respective center and Dean of the concerned School shall recommend suitability of the research proposal keeping in view the availability of infrastructure to carry out the proposed research work, viability of proposal and availability of guide in proposed area of research. If recommended, the student shall modify the research proposal within time limit specified by the committee.

10. REVIEW OF PROGRESS

- i. The supervisor shall regularly monitor the progress of the research work of the scholar. Every scholar shall submit 6-monthly progress report to his/her supervisor and also give an annual seminar outlining his research achievements during the year. Non-submission of two consecutive-reports or failure to give the annual seminar can be basis for possible cancellation of registration. If the supervisor finds that the progress of the work is not satisfactory, a report to that effect shall be submitted to Dean Academic Affairs for appropriate action.

11. MEDIUM OF INSTRUCTION AND EXAMINATION

English shall be the medium of instruction, study, examination and research of the University, except in languages, or else as may be decided by the Academic Council.

12. SUBMISSION AND EVALUATION OF THESIS

- i. Prior to submission of the thesis for Ph.D., the student shall make a pre-submission presentation in the centre that shall be open to all faculty members and research students, for getting feedback and comments, which shall be suitably incorporated into the draft thesis under the advice of the supervisor.
- ii. All Ph.D. scholars shall publish at least one research paper on the topic of thesis in a peer reviewed journal and present at least one paper in a national/international level seminar/conference/workshop before finally submitting the thesis for adjudication and produce evidence for the same in the form of acceptance/participation letter or the reprint of publication.
- iii. Every candidate shall submit with his/her thesis a certificate from the supervisor that the thesis submitted is a record of original research work carried out by him under his/her supervision and that the thesis has not previously formed the basis for the award of any degree/diploma, or other similar titles of this and that the thesis represents independent work of the candidate.
- iv. A panel of not less than six external examiners having present or past affiliation with a reputed university or an accredited institution of higher learning, shall be submitted by the supervisor of the student to the Vice Chancellor for approval through the Coordinator of Centre and the Dean of the concerned School for evaluating the thesis and conducting the viva-voce examination to be held later. The Vice Chancellor may appoint an examiner other than those proposed by supervisor of the candidate also. The Controller of Examinations shall contact each of the approved examiners to seek their consent and arrange the evaluation of thesis and conduct of viva-voce examination of the student.
- v. The external examiner (s) shall not be connected with the university, and shall be known for having made rich contributions to knowledge in their respective area (s) of study.
- vi. The thesis shall be examined by three external examiners, one of these shall be from abroad and at least one of the two remaining examiners shall be from outside the state. For a thesis in subjects in which research is not carried out abroad, all the three examiners shall be from India.

- vii. Each examiner, after examining the thesis submitted by the candidate shall submit a detailed report on a prescribed format along with a clear recommendation that:
- a) in his/her opinion the thesis should be accepted for the award of Ph.D. degree and the public defense and viva-voce examination of the candidate should be held.

or

- b) The thesis should be referred back to the candidate for revision
- viii. No thesis shall earn a degree unless there are two positive reports.

13. CONDUCT OF VIVA-VOCE

- i. After the thesis is approved, a panel comprising the supervisor, one external examiner, the Coordinator of the concerned Centre, and the Dean of the concerned School shall conduct viva-voce examination in the presence of interested faculty members and students.
- ii. In case where any of the examiners who evaluated the thesis is not available, the Vice Chancellor may appoint an eminent person as examiner from already approved panel or from outside the approved panel, for conducting the viva-voce examination.
- iii. A candidate, who is not successful in the viva-voce examination, shall undergo the viva-voce examination second time, within a period of four months. In the event he/she fails again, the Dean of concerned school shall refer the matter to the concerned School Board for decision.
- iv. If the performance of a candidate in viva-voce examination is satisfactory, the Coordinator of concerned Centre, through the Dean concerned shall forward the recommendations of the examiner (s) who adjudicated the thesis and the evaluation of the candidate's performance in viva-voce examination along with other such documents as may be required, by the university to Controller of Examinations for consideration and approval by the Vice Chancellor.
- v. No candidate shall be permitted to resubmit his/her thesis more than once

14. AWARD OF DEGREE

- i. The successful candidates shall be admitted to and conferred the Degree of Doctor of Philosophy in the respective discipline, as the case may be, provided he/she has:
- ii. No pending dues to the university, hostel or library outstanding
- iii. No disciplinary action pending against him/her
- iv. Fulfilled such other conditions and requirements as prescribed under rules
- v. For those candidates who have qualified for the degree in disciplines which are interdisciplinary in nature, the university may issue the degree in the respective discipline in which they have registered and have completed their programme.
- vi. Along with the degree, the university shall issue a certificate to the effect that the degree has been awarded in accordance with the provisions of UGC (MINIMUM STANDARDS AND PROCEDURE FOR AWARD OF M.Phil./Ph.D. DEGREE), REGULATIONS, 2009. However, the Academic Council, on the recommendation of the Vice Chancellor shall have the right to withdraw the degree if plagiarism or any other form of malpractice is detected at any stage, and to initiate such further action as it deems fit. Provided that the Vice Chancellor shall get the complaint in the matter investigated

confidentially and shall give the accused an opportunity to explain before he makes his recommendation on the matter to the Academic Council.

12. Fees

- i. Fees to be paid by the student during the Ph.D. programme will be laid down from time to time by the university.

15. DEPOSITORY WITH UGC

- i. Within thirty days of the successful completion of the evaluation process and announcements of the award of Ph.D. degree, the university shall host a read only version of the Ph.D. thesis on Shodhganga through INFLIBNET to make it accessible to all Institutions/Universities.

16. POWER TO REMOVE ANY DIFFICULTY

- i. Notwithstanding what is contained in the Regulations; the Chairperson, Academic Council may in exceptional circumstances and on the recommendations of the School Board concerned or an appropriate Committee on the merits of each individual case consider, and for reasons to be recorded, allow relaxation of any of the provisions except those prescribing CGPA requirements.

17. COPYRIGHTS

- i. Central University of Punjab reserves the copyright for the thesis for which the university has awarded the Ph.D. degree.
- ii. In case of any ambiguity/non-availability of rules in these Rules and Regulations, the decision of the Vice chancellor shall be final. Notwithstanding anything contained in these rules and regulations, the Vice Chancellor may take such measures as may be necessary for removal of doubts/difficulties and to resolve any other extraordinary issues.

Earn While You Learn (EWYL) Scheme

Central University of Punjab, Bathinda, supports to make the students self-reliant and develop their creativity and skills during their stay at university. The university encourages the students to take up part time jobs at the university to make them independent under the "Earn While You Learn" scheme on campus.

Objectives

1. Exploit the immense potential of students as a valuable human resource.
2. Involve the students in management and development of the institution.
3. Give students hands on experience and thereby prepare them for jobs in future.
4. Encourage young students to learn about dignity of labour.
5. Prevent students from avoidable distractions and engage them in meaningful, positive activities.
6. Enable meritorious and needy students to earn a reasonable amount every month to meet their expenses.

Eligibility

- Students who are registered in CUPB for any programme.
- The students should not be the recipients of fellowship/financial aid from any other funding agency, either private or public.
- All post graduate students (with above criteria) of the university departments can be considered for the assistants in library, laboratory, computer centre and store.
- A supervisor may be nominated to monitor the progress work and maintain the attendance record under each category and he/she may countersign with the COC for forwarding the monthly claims.

In order to keep vigil on the deployment of students and payments to be made to them the following restrictions/ rules are required to be imposed:

1. Students may be assigned a task for maximum 1 hour per day during the weekdays and 4 hours/day during the weekends.
2. The working hours will be before or beyond the regular scheduled classes and studies should get affected due to working under EWYL scheme.
3. The EWYL committee shall make the recommendation for the selection of candidates.
4. Enrollment register is to be maintained by the concerned faculty/staff which may contain full particulars of the enrolled student and details of the work to be allocated to him mentioning therein actual working hours.
5. The concerned faculty/staff is to verify the work done and will record on the payment voucher that the student has actually worked for which the remuneration is being paid.
6. The accounts section has to maintain the entire record and will produce the same for scrutiny as and when requested by the audit.

7. Any student claiming false payments will be immediately terminated from the EWYL scheme and disciplinary action will be taken against him.

Under the Earn While You Learn (EWYL) scheme the students can be assigned various tasks as listed below in the university campus:

Laboratories: In the labs/workshops the students can be engaged for making them responsible for handling the equipment/machinery, its maintenance and upkeep, storage of equipment and upkeep of Laboratories/Workshops. Senior students shall be useful for conduct of practicals.

- Preparing protocol handouts for practicals and research work.
- Helping the faculty in the purchase of essential laboratory accessories. ➤ Maintenance of stock registers and other record in the laboratory.

Library: The students engaged for library jobs such as cataloguing, re-shelving of the books and journals in shelves, display of books, repair and binding the books.

Office: The students can also be engaged for performance of various office jobs like preparation of statements, compilation and analysis of data, maintenance of student and faculty data and help in preparation of reports.

University Stores: Store inventory, data entry, maintaining registers.

Hostel/Mess: Maintenance of hostel records such as student's attendance, general cleanliness in the mess and hostel.

Selection Procedure

The applications from students would be invited any time a need of additional help is felt by any center/office of the university. The EWYL Committee shall select the students on the basis of students interest, expertise (if any) and the knowledge/skills the applicant has.

Dear Sir,

We are submitting herewith our following points / queries for consideration in the Pre-Bid Meeting and issuing necessary corrigendum :

1. **Retention Money :**

As per Tender Clause 62.1.3 the retention money is to be deducted from running bills is 10% which may be reduced to 2.5% to facilitate sufficient cash flow with the working contractor.

Further as per this clause non-refundable interest is to be charged at a rate two percent more than the SBI's PLR rate, from the date of BG towards security deposit becomes due and shall be chargeable on the reducing balance left after apportioning the SD amount accumulated from each running bill, till complete SD amount is recovered from the bills. In this regard we hereby submit that the owner / employer should not charge any interest when the contractor has furnished necessary BG of the equal amount.

2. **Performance Guarantee :**

Similarly as per tender clause 62.1.1 the performance guarantee / security is to be submitted by the contractor @10% which may also be reduced to 2.5% to facilitate sufficient cash flow with the working contractor.

3. **Statutory Permissions & Clearances :**

All statutory permissions & clearances from any department / agency required, if any, before commencement of the work or after completion thereof, shall be in the scope of owner / employer and shall be arranged well in time so that there is no delay in the commencement of the work.

4. **Time Limit (Time Period) :**
Time period of 21 months stipulated for completion of the project is very short. Keeping in consideration, the magnitude and type of intricate & complicated work; it should be increased to 30 months.
5. **Heritage & Cultural Cess :**
Heritage & Cultural Cess as applicable in the state (Punjab) shall be paid directly by the owner itself to the concerned department as per procedure in vogue.
6. **Labour Cess :**
Labour Cess @1% being applicable in the state (Punjab), should be made payable to the contractor.
7. **Escalation (Price Adjustment) :**
Price adjustment is provided for Cement & Steel only. This is a very prestigious & complex project where the cost of materials other than Cement & Steel is very high and substantial. Similarly highly technically skilled labour is to be deployed for this project whose cost will also be very substantial & will definitely escalate during 21 months. As such price variation should be provided as per standard formulae of CPWD for materials other than Cement and Steel also, along with labour & POL.
8. **DNIT Rates :**
Rates of all the items of DNIT do not tally with the DSR 2014 and DSR 2013. So, the basis of DNIT Rates is not clear. However, it is worth mentioning that rates of some of the major items like Reinforcement Steel, Plain & Reinforced Cement Concrete, Brick Work and other few major items are very low. The makes specified for the Reinforcement steel as per Annexure Vc (Page No. 310 of 496) are SAIL, TATA Steel Limited (TSL), RINL, Jindal Steel & Power Limited, JSW Steel Limited, which are costlier by Rs.6.00 to Rs.7.00 per kg over normal reinforcement steel conforming to ISI. Hence the rate taken in the DNIT i.e. Rs.57.00 per kg including cost of material, labour & profits etc., is quite unrealistic and is approx 20% less than the DSR Rate. Similarly, other rates are also approx 15% less than the DSR rates 2014. The rates are, therefore, required to be corrected in conformity with the DSR 2014 or

otherwise. Under the circumstances explained, either all DNIT rates are required to be corrected or alternatively, the mode of tender may be changed from \pm (Plus/Minus) percentage tender into item rate tender for which DNIT needs revision. The tender date also needs suitable extension.

9. **Mobilization Advance :**

Interest free mobilization advance may be allowed and bank guarantee of the equal / same amount may be accepted.

10. **Approved Makes for Electrical :**

The following reputed and equivalent best makes may also be added in the list of approved makes :

- a) MCCB : Siemens, Havel
- b) Panel Manufacturer : Any other CPRI approved manufacturers
- c) Street Light Poles : Crompton

11. **Clause No. 61.0 Office Facilities for owner / EIL :**

Providing Office facilities as described in (para a to f) should be subject to payment to the contractor.

12. The option for the reverse option concept as per Appendix A to ITB of tender document may be deleted.

13. **Comprehensive Maintenance :**

The concept of the comprehensive maintenance and security deposit demanded @10% is not cleared in the tender document and needs to be cleared.

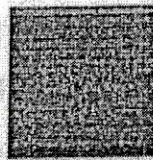

JUNIOR RESEARCH FELLOWSHIP IN SCIENCE, HUMANITIES AND SOCIAL SCIENCES

INTRODUCTION

The Junior Research Fellowship (JRF) scheme of the University Grants Commission (UGC) is open to candidates who qualify in the National Eligibility Testing (NET) of the UGC and the UGC-Council of Scientific and Industrial Research (CSIR) joint test. However, please note that these are qualifying tests only and do not bestow a fellowship upon the candidate.

OBJECTIVE

The objective of the JRF scheme is to provide opportunities to NET-qualified candidates to undertake advanced studies and research leading to M.Phil/Ph.D. Degrees in Humanities and Social Sciences including Languages and Sciences.

TARGET GROUP/ELIGIBILITY

Target Group: Candidates who have qualified in NET or the UGC-CSIR joint tests.

Eligibility: Candidates who have qualified in NET or the UGC-CSIR joint test. However, the selection for the JRF is made by the universities/institutions/colleges.

NATURE OF ASSISTANCE AVAILABLE UNDER THE SCHEME:-

The tenure of fellowship is initially for two years under the JRF scheme. Upon expiry of this period, the work of the Fellow will be evaluated by experts. If the research work is found satisfactory, his/her tenure will be extended for a further period of three years under the enhanced emoluments of the Senior Research Fellowship (SRF).

In case the work for the first two years is not found satisfactory, an additional year will be given to him/her for improvement. However, during this period he/she will be designated as a Junior Research Fellow. In such cases work will be evaluated again after three years, and if improvement is found, the Fellow will get two more years under the SRF. Thus, the total period of fellowship (JRF and SRF) is five years, will no further provision of extension.

House Rent Allowance: Suitable single-seated hostel accommodation may be provided to the JRF candidate in the institutions. In case of non-availability, HRA as per rules of the university/institution will be paid, to the fellow subject to the submission of HRA Certificate through the Registrar/Principal. Junior Research Fellows provided with accommodation in a hostels recognized/maintained by the institutions may be reimbursed the hostel fee, excluding mess, electricity and water charges, etc. A certificate to this effect is to be furnished through the Registrar/Principal (Annexure I). If the fellow makes his/her own arrangements of accommodation, he/she may be entitled to draw HRA as per categorization of cities by the Government of India. The fellow will submit a certificate for the purpose to the UGC for claiming HRA through the concerned university/institution/colleges.

Medical: No separate/fixed medical assistance is provided. However, the fellow may avail of the medical facilities available in the institution/university/college.

Leave: JRFs are entitled for a maximum period of 30 days of leave in a year in addition to public holidays. They are not entitled to any other vacations. Women candidates are eligible for maternity leave of 180 days at full rates of fellowship once during the tenure of their award. Beside this an 'Intermittent Break' for a maximum period of 2 years may also be permissible to the women candidate. This Flexi Time period should not be counted towards the tenure of the Fellowship and thus effectively the total period of fellowship should remain the same.

In special cases Junior Research Fellows may be allowed leave without fellowship by the Commission upto one academic year during the entire tenure of the award for accepting teaching assignments on a temporary basis, provided the assignment is in the same city/town. In other cases, leave without fellowship will be restricted to a period not exceeding three months during the tenure of the award on the recommendations of the supervisor and the institution. The period of leave without fellowship will be counted towards the total tenure of the award. JRF/SRFs are advised to apply for leave through universities/institutions/colleges well in advance for the approval of the Commission.

Procedure For Applying For The Scheme:-

Only NET/UGC-CSIR joint tests qualified candidates are eligible to apply (for fellowship) under the scheme. The qualified candidates have to apply against the advertisements given by the universities/institutions/colleges recognized under Sec. 2 (f) and 12 (B) of the UGC Act. The selection is made as per the procedure of respective institutions. Those Universities/Institutes are not recognized under UGC Act. They may be enclosed notification of Govt. of India.

Proceedings of the Meeting of the Committee constituted to submit its recommendations for implementation of reservation for PwD in various Group i.e A, B & C

The matter regarding implementation of reservation for PwD in various group i.e A, B, C & D was discussed in the meeting of the committee (constituted vide Office Order No CUPB/CC/14/OO/4537 dated 02/12/2014) held on 17/12/2014. The Committee recommends the following:

The University needs to follow the guidelines of MHRD w.r.t Reservation Policy for PWDs as per which the University need to reserve 3% of the total number of vacancies in the group strength of which 1% each shall be reserved for persons suffering from (i) Blindness or Low Vision, (ii) Hearing impairment and (iii) Locomotor Disability or Cerebral Palsy (refer Flag-A).

The UGC has sanctioned the following strength of non Teaching Staff in each group:

S.No	Group	No. of Posts	3% reservation for PWD
1.	Group – A	22 Posts	0.66 i.e Nil
2.	Group – B	34 Posts	1.02 i.e 01
3.	Group – C	75 Posts	2.25 i.e 02

(As per the 6th CPC recommendations all Group 'D' Posts stand upgraded to Group C pay band – 1 with GP 1800 because of which the reservations are proposed by the Committee only for Group A, B & C group posts. Refer Flag-B)

As per above the University need to reserve 01 post in Group B (3% of 34) & 02 posts in Group C (3% of 75) for PWD. Further as per the direction of MHRD the University needs to identify the persons with disability with 1% for persons suffering from (i) Blindness or Low Vision, (ii) Hearing impairment and (iii) Locomotor Disability or Cerebral Palsy.

As no priority is given for reservation out of the 3% the Committee recommends that the following posts may be identified and reserved for PWD (below mentioned posts are selected from the detailed list of posts duly identified to be reserved for PwD's by the Office of the Chief Commissioner for Persons with Disability Ministry of Social Justice and Empowerment, Government of India- Refer Flag-C):

Group – B, Post – 01; Private Secretary with Grade pay 4600;
Reserved for OH i.e Orthopedically Handicapped i.e for person suffering from Locomotor Disability or Cerebral Palsy

Group – C, Post – 01 ; LDC with GP 1900,
Reserved for Hearing Handicapped i.e Hearing impairment

Group – C, Post – 02 ; Pharmacist with GP 2800,
Reserved for OH i.e Orthopedically Handicapped i.e for person suffering from Locomotor Disability or Cerebral Palsy

The posts and the subjects for which the same can be reserved needs to be deliberated by a committee consisting of senior faculty members.

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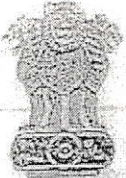

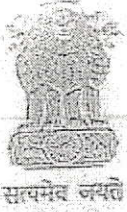

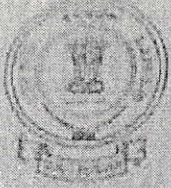

MEMORANDUM OF UNDERSTANDING

BETWEEN

CENTRAL UNIVERSITY OF PUNJAB, BATHINDA

AND

CENTRE FOR RESEARCH IN RURAL AND INDUSTRIAL DEVELOPMENT,
CHANDIGARH

1. **The Central University of Punjab, Bathinda** hereinafter referred to as "CUPB" has been established through the Central Universities Act 2009 which received the assent of the President of India on 20th March 2009. Its territorial jurisdiction extends to the whole State of Punjab. This fast growing newly set up Central University at Bathinda is an important link in the recently set up chain of Central Universities created in the educationally backward areas throughout the country. This University is destined to emerge as a premier educational institution with the state of the art infrastructure to provide quality education and research in science and technology as well as humanities and social sciences.
2. **The Centre for Research in Rural and Industrial Development, Chandigarh** hereinafter referred to as "CRRID" is a scientific and educational society registered under the Indian Societies Registration Act, 1860 since July 1978. The CRRID promotes research, publication, training and similar other creative activities. The CRRID is supported by the Indian Council of Social Science Research (ICSSR), New Delhi, it enjoys the distinction of being the only one of its kind in the north-western states of Punjab, Haryana, Himachal Pradesh, Jammu and Kashmir and the Union Territory of Chandigarh. The CRRID was accorded the "national status" in 1985 by the ICSSR, Ministry of Human Resource Development, Government of India. Both Government of India and the government of Punjab have been supporting CRRID in its endeavour by providing regular financial grants on matching basis. In 1986 the Ministry of Health and Family Welfare, Government of India, approved the setting up of a Population Research Centre at CRRID with full financial support. The Department of Scientific and Industrial Research, Ministry of Science and

Technology, Government of India has also granted recognition to CRRID as a Scientific and Industrial Research Organization.

This MEMORANDUM OF UNDERSTANDING (MoU) is entered into on this day of March _____, 2015

BETWEEN

The Central University of Punjab being represented by its Vice Chancellor, having its office at Bathinda, Punjab in India, hereinafter referred to as the PARTY OF THE FIRST PART.

AND

The Centre for Research in Rural and Industrial Development, being represented by its Director General Dr. Kuldip Kaur and as an alternate by Professor Sucha Singh Gill, Professor of South Asia and Principal Adviser, CRRID, having its office at Chandigarh, hereinafter referred to as the PARTY OF THE SECOND PART.

WHEREAS, the Party of the First Part is an educational institution and national importance engaged in advancement of teaching and research in several branches of humanities, social sciences and science.

WHEREAS both party of First Party and the party of the Second Part have come to an understanding to promote cooperation between two organizations in the field of education and research and development of cooperative efforts to enhance the academic interchange between the two institutions.

NOW, THEREFORE, IT IS HEREBY MUTUALLY AGREED BY AND BETWEEN THE PARTIES AS FOLLOWS:

1. This MoU is valid for a period of five years.
2. Both the parties will promote cooperation between two organizations in the field of education and research.
3. Both the parties will work together to enhance the academic interchange between the two institutions.

4. Both the parties shall decide mutually the sharing of expenses in carrying out each activity comprising surveys, studies, research, exchange of faculty, lectures, seminars and conferences to be jointly organized between the two parties, or any other activity to be mutually decided.

TERMS AND CONDITIONS

1. The MoU shall be deemed to have been automatically rescinded after the expiry of the MoU period, unless renewed for any further period as per mutually agreed upon terms at a later stage.
2. It is further agreed that following the termination of the MoU, both the parties shall refrain from carrying out the balance of the activity agreed upon in this MoU.
3. Either of the parties hitherto shall be entitled to terminate the MoU at any time with valid reasons acceptable in writing to both parties and in such case, the MoU will terminate six months after the date of written notification or date of expiry of the MoU, whichever is earlier. In case of such premature termination of the MoU, all rights and obligations of both parties shall automatically cease except for those covered by written contracts including ongoing collaborative activity that can no longer be cancelled.
4. Termination of MoU shall be done in a cost-effective manner subject to proper turnover and accounting of expenses that may have been incurred, where applicable.
5. In case of any dispute that may crop up during execution of MoU, the matter would be settled through arbitration by referring to a committee jointly appointed by both parties.
